History and the News

In the 1600s, people heard the news from a person called a **town crier**. Most people couldn't read, so they listened to the news. The town crier stood in the town square, rang a bell, and shouted the news for everyone to hear.

In the 1700s, people started buying **newspapers** to read the news. Many towns printed their own newspapers. People could read **local news** to learn about things that happened in their town.

Newspaper **articles** had information about many different topics, like sports and business. People could read **international news** to learn about different parts of the world.



Journalists work hard to write newspaper articles. They go to events, talk to many people, and search for information. **Photographers** take pictures of the people and events.

In the past, most newspapers went to people's houses with the mail. Today, people can read the newspaper online.
